30th August - 1st September 2023, Leipzig, Germany

In 2019 the then newly appointed EU-Commission proclaimed an epochal new political agenda aimed at transforming the European Union towards environmentally sustainable and carbon neutral economy: the European Green Deal (EGD). In accordance with its overarching, transformative ambition the EGD consists of a comprehensive set of sector policies including climate & energy, industry, building, pollution, biodiversity, agriculture and mobility while also addressing the overarching objectives of green finance, just transition, inclusiveness and global responsibility. Since its launch in 2019 the Commission has further elaborated these policies through sector strategies. Based on these strategies, the process has now entered the stage of legal implementation. With a plethora of legislative initiatives, the Commission addresses nearly all fields of environmental law, and also goes far beyond traditional environmental regulation towards, inter alia, the greening of energy, agriculture, trade and finance.

The 10th EELF conference is dedicated to assessing these far-reaching legal developments: how they will play out in their legal context and in national implementation, and whether they will work effectively towards the aspired sustainability transformation – within and beyond EU borders. Plenary and parallel sessions will be held on the following main topics:

- > Overarching and constitutional aspects of the EGD and the role of law in transformation
- Climate Governance and EGD energy policy –in the face of the energy crisis
- Green industry & circular economy
- Biodiversity, nature conservation and agriculture
- Zero Pollution
- Green Finance
- Global responsibility
- > Further fields and aspects of EGD implementation

Main conference venue

- **By car**: On A14 motorway take exit "Leipzig-Ost" and head for Leipzig Stadtzentrum/City Centre. Follow Permoserstrasse up to the underground parking sign for conference Leipziger KUBUS on right hand side.
- By tram: In front of Central Station Leipzig take tram No. 3 / 3E (heading to "Sommerfeld" or "Taucha"); after about 15 minutes get off at "Torgauer/ Permoserstraße"; walk Permoserstraße 300 metres eastward to find the entrance of KUBUS on the left.
- By plane: From Airport Leipzig/Halle take train (regional express) to Central Station Leipzig; from the Central Station take tram No. 3 as explained above
